

Dear Alumni:

Greetings from the Fort. 2020 has been a challenging year and we hope this letter finds you safe and healthy as we continue managing life in a pandemic.

Since schools went fully remote in March 2020, we've been working to maintain what makes Fort Hamilton HS special. Our caring and dynamic staff learned to adapt in-person lessons to a remote environment, but nothing could replace the human interaction of seeing and interacting with students daily in the building. Students who did not complete course requirements during the spring or summer terms did not fail. Instead, they earned a mark of incomplete and have through January 2021 to make up the required work for credit. In addition, students were eligible for a Regents exam waiver if they completed the course sequence and were due to take an exam in June or August 2020.

While we were unable to host live performances in spring 2020, we shared a virtual dance concert to celebrate accomplishments of our seniors and other dancers in the Joffrey Ballet Academy. Other spring 2020 events were virtual, including Senior Awards and Graduation for the Class of 2020. Many returned in September to pick up diplomas, yearbooks, and awards, and we were able to retrieve books, computers, and uniforms for marching band, etc. We will continue this distribution every Wednesday morning to accommodate students and their families.

SY2020-21 began with students remotely on September 16. To maintain social distancing in the building and classrooms, we created five cohorts for students to attend in person and one remote cohort. The first day that blended students attended in person was October 1. Things went smoothly because we had a great team to check health screening surveys, take temperatures, and distribute thermometers. Students have been cooperative about wearing the mask and walking single file in the halls. While 400-500 students in the building per day is nothing compared to 4,600, we are managing students in person while 80% of the class is remote.

We added a fourth Drama Academy class from Cohort 2024, and we have wonderful productions ahead, albeit virtual for the foreseeable future. The performing arts will still thrive at Fort Hamilton HS, and we look forward to live performances down the road. Athletics are on hold for the time being and we hope will resume this school year.

The external work on our roof and parapet continues with the promise of completion by the end of 2020. We continue to maximize our space and utilize all funds to benefit students.

We stand firm in our commitment to provide students a safe and secure environment that prepares them for college and career.

I am proud to have received a full scholarship to the University Of Chicago thanks to a program called QuestBridge. UChicago was the start of my journey as I navigated through the college process as a first-generation, low-income, student of color and it was my dream school ever since attending a Young Leaders Summit there.

I received 10 competitive travel grants and had the time of my life because I had never been on a plane before. With each trip, I learned a lot about myself and how I would pursue higher education.

Though I've had many successes, I have not usually been vocal about my failures, but this year was extremely hard on me. My father passed in December of last year from his battle with lung cancer. I faked being okay for as long as I could remember, I never really let myself feel anything. It killed me to think that he would not be able to watch me cross the stage at graduation, but a plus to it being canceled is that I won't have to endure that. The toughest part was watching my mom slowly deteriorate and the pain we shared in our hearts. My sister left college to come to help me take care of my 25year-old brother who has cerebral palsy. My sister keeps saying that if only one of us can go to college that it has to me. It kills me to feel like my family surviving is contingent on my success at the second most rigorous institution in the country.

I cannot second guess if I am ready for the challenge, I just have to be. I am known for being the kid that screams "Major Key Alert" on the announcements, but I always considered school an escape from the insurmountable pressure I was feeling at home. That is why I never shared my adversities, I never wanted to mix the two. These experiences are unfortunate, however, I am stronger because of them.

I have used these experiences to fuel my passions, including the PERIOD Movement, the National Honor Society and Muslim Student Association, Model UN and our school's Key Club. I am also on the baseball, moot court, mock trial, and cheerleading teams. I made news as the first male cheerleader at Ft. Hamilton. That was

the focus of my college essay, in particular, having to cheer on the athletes that bullied me. I also took classes at Pace University. I've had the pleasure of representing my graduating class as junior senator and two years in a row on the senior cohort. I have tried to leave my mark on Ft. Hamilton. While trying to do so I have gotten some once in a lifetime opportunities.

I was published by TIME Magazine, discussing my perspective on the college application process and how navigating it can be harder for disadvantaged students. I was also published with Pace University with one of my professors and had an article published about me and my work for educational and gender equity by <u>Medium.com</u>.

Just writing this felt like a rollercoaster. Thank you, Fort Hamilton for creating this ride with me and helping me get over my fear of the big drop.

My time at Fort Hamilton High School has been something truly unexpected, but something I am grateful for.


